Mountains: high areas of land. Desert: hot and dry habitat.

Beach: land of sand, shingle or pebbles along the ocean.

Forest: land dominated by trees.

Rainforest: warm and wet climate where green plants grow.

Bush: wild land.

Coastline: where the sea meets the land.
